Meet Dr. Joman Y. Natsheh

Dr. Natsheh, a physician-neuroscientist, is the Research Lead for the Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics section of Children's Specialized Hospital. She is also a Research Assistant Professor at Rutgers University Medical School and a Visiting Scientist at Kessler Foundation. Her research focuses on characterizing cognitive and brain function patterns of different neurodevelopmental disorders. She leads the efforts to establish a research nucleus at the Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics section. In particular, she focuses on building original research studies and collaborations, while engaging the clinical staff who are interested in research. Dr. Natsheh's role will be a model that we aspire to replicate in different CSH medical sections.

Distinguished Lecture Series

Our next Distinguished Lecture Series webinar is July 22, 2021, entitled "Mild Traumatic Brain Injury Among Children: From Evidence-Based Guidelines to Emerging Research"

Speaker: Angela Lumba-Brown, MD, Stanford University

Dr. Lumba-Brown is a pediatric emergency medicine physician with expertise in neuroscience and neurocritical emergencies. She is a national expert on traumatic brain injury and has led several recent large guideline projects. A member of the Board of Scientific Counselors for the Centers for Disease Control's (CDC) National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, she is also the co-director of the Stanford Brain Performance Center where she works to advance the neuroscience of childhood development, injury, and aging through prevention, novel biomarker discovery and other diagnostics, and treatments. Deeper Dive: SPARK

SPARK is the largest ASD research study in the United States In each issue, we will take a deeper dive on a specific CSH research study. This month's focus is on the SPARK (Simons Powering Autism Research) project. SPARK is funded by the Simons Foundation and is for people with ASD of any age, living in the US, and their families. CSH is one of 31 clinical sites participating in SPARK. SPARK's goal is to speed up understanding of ASD by collecting information from surveys and DNA to find possible genetic causes of autism, power future autism research on a wide variety of topics, and build a growing community of individuals, families, and researchers. Currently, over 27,000 families with ASD have joined SPARK. Participants can enroll online from home and are eligible to receive gift cards for submitting saliva or other survey completion. CSH Recent Publications

Research at CSH was highlighted in recent issues of the Journal of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics. In a study by Drs. Myriam Casseus and JenFu Cheng, healthcare utilization of children with cerebral palsy was examined. They found that children with CP have high prevalence of chronic health conditions and are also more likely to have unmet need for care coordination. This underscores the importance of effective care coordination in this population.

Drs. Manny Jimenez and Jill Harris, together with Drs. Caroline Coffield and Deborah Spitalnik (Principal Investigator) from the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, conducted a study to better understand the experiences of Latino parents of young children newly diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder.
