About the Research Center

The Children's Specialized Hospital Research Center aims to advance pediatric rehabilitation by conducting and supporting scientific research that explores innovative interventions, technologies and approaches to specialized care for children and adolescents.

The Center focuses on five core areas:

<u>Autism Spectrum Disorder</u>

Brain Injury

Chronic Health Conditions

Cognition

Mobility

The Center offers training programs for students and early career research scientists through research <u>internships</u> and the <u>postdoctoral fellowship</u> program. Students represent universities across the country. This year's spring research interns are students studying neuroscience, pharmacy, and public health.

The Center sponsors the quarterly <u>Distinguished Lecture Series</u>, a free research education program for health care professionals to learn about cutting edge research in autism spectrum disorder, brain injury, chronic health conditions, cognition and mobility

Researcher Highlight

Meet Dr. Manny Jimenez

Dr. Jimenez is a Developmental Pediatrician at the New Brunswick Plum Street location of Children's Specialized Hospital. He is also Assistant Professor of Pediatrics & Family Medicine and Community Health at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, Chancellor's Scholar, and Director of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics Education with the NJ Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Education (NJ LEND). Dr. Jimenez is a leader in making the health system more responsive to the needs of vulnerable populations. His research has focused on understanding the relationship between early adversity and child development, improving access to developmental services and therapies for young children, literacy promotion within the Latinx community, and promoting optimal child development in the medical home.

Dr. Jimenez is the principal investigator for a \$5 million grant from the National Institutes of Health to improve access to COVID-19 testing to underserved and vulnerable populations. Read about the project here. Watch this video to learn more about what drives Dr. Jimenez to pursue research.

Distinguished Lecture Series

Our most recent Distinguished Lecture Series webinar: March 29th, 2021, entitled "Genomic discoveries prompt new questions and new opportunities in cerebral palsy."

Speaker: Michael C. Kruer, MD, from Phoenix Children's Hospital

Dr. Kruer is a neurodevelopmental disabilities pediatrician and child neurologist who spoke about genetics associated with cerebral palsy and potential of personalized medicine and linkage to treatment.

Deeper Dive: Pediatric Quality of Life Study

In each issue, we will take a deeper dive on a specific CSH research study. This month's focus is on the Pediatric Quality of Life (PedsQL) research project. The PedsQL project analyzes patient and caregiver reports of quality of life at admission and discharge from CSH services. The PedsQL is a validated instrument designed to measure health related quality of life and is intended for healthy, acute and chronically ill populations. CSH has been collecting data since 2015. At present, data from children and caregivers of children diagnosed with both ASD and attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) is under investigation.

How does a dual diagnosis of ASD and ADHD affect caregiver perceptions of their child's quality of life?

CSH Recent Publications

CSH experts and researchers have significantly contributed to the field of specialized care for children and adolescents. One method of contribution is through publication of high-quality research that can advance the understanding of many pediatric conditions, and contribute to increased quality of life of children with disabilities.
