Recognizing and Responding to Human Trafficking in a Healthcare Context

New State Statute:

All Physicians and Health Providers Must Complete Mandatory Human Trafficking Training

WHY?

Research shows that a very large number of human trafficking victims access a health care facility or provider during their trafficking situation. Now several states, including New Jersey, are requiring human trafficking training for health care staff to help identify victims. All health care workers and volunteers in New Jersey who have contact with patients – regardless if the contact is clinical or non-clinical – must complete training in recognizing and intervening in cases of human trafficking. All Community Medical Center team members, volunteers and members of the Medical Staff must complete training as per this new state statute.
