WENDY WILLIAMS ANNOUNCED AS GUEST SPEAKER FOR THE 18TH ANNUAL POWER OF PINK LUNCHEON

Williams grew up in Ocean Township and currently lives in Northern New Jersey with her husband Kevin and their 12-year-old son Kevin Jr.

Dr. Graebe is an accomplished physician, recognized for his work in reproductive endocrinology. He is also one of the first physicians to incorporate the use of Monmouth Medical Center's robotic surgery system to improve patient outcomes.

Prior to taking on his current role, Dr. Graebe served as section chief of reproductive endocrinology at Monmouth since 1985. Board certified in obstetrics and gynecology, Dr. Graebe is a member of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology and American Fertility Society. Among his teaching awards, he received the Nathan Kasc Award for Teaching Excellence from Yale University School of Medicine and Pelviscopy and Laser Surgery Teaching Award from the chief residents in obstetrics and Gynecology at Monmouth. He was twice honored with the Gerald R. Cureton Award for Teaching Excellence at Monmouth, and as a resident at Monmouth, he



SPOTLIGHT ON MEDICAL EDUCATION: COMMISSIONER OF HEALTH MARY E. O'DOWD VISI **MONMOUTH MEDICAL CENTER**

COMMISSIONER MARY O'DOWD visited Monmouth Medical Center in March with Frank J. Vozos, M.D., FACS, President and Chief Executive Officer, and Thomas A. Biga, Executive Vice President of Operations for Barnabas Health, along with members of the hospital's senior leadership team.

During her visit, the Commissioner spoke with attending physicians and medical residents about the scope of programs and services available at Monmouth Medical Center. She toured through several areas of the hospital, including the Geriatric Emergency Unit in the Emergency Department and the Pediatrics Unit.

Following the brief tour, the Commissioner held a roundtable discussion in the Board Room where she had the opportunity to speak with medical residents from the eight medical residency disciplines offered at Monmouth. Residents represented orthopedic surgery, general surgery, dentistry, Ob/ Gyn, internal medicine, diagnostic radiology, pediatrics and pathology. The Commissioner spoke to the residents about

their educational experiences and their choice in choosing New Jersey and Monmouth for their residencies.

Medical education has long played a key role at Monmouth Medical Center. In 1945, Monmouth established its first residency program in orthopaedics to meet the needs of physicians returning from World War II trained in treating battlefield trauma. Today Monmouth has 120 resident physicians in eight accredited programs.

"As an accredited diploma-granting institution, Monmouth Medical Center prides itself not just on providing quality health care, but on preparing the physicians of tomorrow," says Dr. Vozos, who trained in general surgery at Monmouth. "Teaching hospitals are responsible for training new generations of physicians and are the frontrunners in medical research and technology."

Monmouth Medical Center will receive \$4.4 million in Graduate Medical Education funding from the state in 2014, an increase of \$1.1 million from the current fiscal year.



MONMOUTH MEDICAL RESIDENCY PROGRAMS AND MED SCHOOL GRADUATES A PERFECT MATCH

MONMOUTH MEDICAL CENTER has

emerged from the national match process — which each spring pairs medical school students and hospitals offering graduate medical education with all residency positions filled.

As part of the National Resident Matching Program, the deans of all American medical schools on November 1 release letters of recommendation and the transcripts for their graduating students. Medical students apply to individual residency programs, and there is an intensive period of interviewing from November to January.

The Association of American Medical Colleges administers the computerized match, pairing each applicant with only one program and providing residency programs with only as many names as needed to fill all slots. Residency slots are filled when a residency program's choice for a resident and a medical student's choice for residency program match.

"We are very pleased with the high caliber of this match, and feel our continuously strong showing makes a very impressive statement for the medical education program at Monmouth Medical Center," says Joseph Jaeger, Dr. PH., the hospital's associate vice president of academic affairs. "This was the first year that academic medical centers faced tough new rules that required them to either obtain all residents exclusively through the competitive matching process, or do so completely outside the match process. We recruited very well, and have a great group of young doctors coming to us."

Recently, Dr. Jaeger, participated in the Board of Directors meeting and attended the full annual meeting of the Alliance of Independent Academic Medical Centers in Naples, Fla. The Secretary / Treasurer of the Board and a member of the Conference Planning Committee, he has been nominated by the Alliance and the American Hospital Association to represent teaching hospitals nationwide on the Accreditation Council of Graduate Medical Education's Institutional Review Committee.

At Monmouth, the new physicians-in-training will begin their residencies on July 1.

AN APPLE FOR THE TEACHER CAN BE a way to curry favor,

or it can be a recognition of excellence. It's the latter for Children's Hospital at Monmouth Medical Center resident pediatrician Panagiotis Kratimemos, M.D., who was recognized recently with a Golden Apple Award bestowed by medical school students from the class of 2014 at Drexel University College of Medicine, Philadelphia, the hospital's teaching affiliate.

Also receiving an award was Allan Robert Tunkel, M.D., Ph.D., MACP, chairman of the Department of Medicine at Monmouth, who will receive Drexel's Blockley-Osler Award. Chosen by the Drexel University College of Medicine graduating class of 2013, Dr. Tunkel is being recognized for "excellence in the teaching of clinical medicine in the tradition of William Osler, M.D., who made teaching at the autopsy table and bedside customary in America."

The awards were presented at a reception after the Drexel University College of Medicine Commencement on May 17.
