









Founded in 1917, Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital Rahway's Emergency Department provides care for all health emergencies close to home. Our physical, occupational and speech staff provide therapy for those with neurological conditions, such as Parkinson's disease. The rehab department at the hospital and satellite facilities in Scotch Plains and Carteret have extensive therapeutic services, including peripheral neuropathy therapy, concussion therapy, and pelvic floor and incontinence therapy. Physical and aquatic therapy at RWJ Rahway Fitness & Wellness centers in Scotch Plains and Carteret consistently receive praise from patients. The specialized care offered at the Center for Wound Healing and Hyperbaric Medicine heals wounds faster than the national average through use of hyperbaric chambers. In addition to a wide range of cardiac testing, the hospital runs a sleep lab, and the Diabetes program is certified by the American Diabetes Association. The recent ribbon-cutting for the opening of the new Surgical Center of Excellence 3E Unit in honor of John and Christine Kline was the culmination of a legacy of giving that spans four decades. The Klines, in part with their lead gift, raised \$100,000 for the unit's renovation, which will greatly enhance patient care at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital (RWJUH) Rahway. John Kline, MD, retired in November 2018 after a long career in orthopedic surgery and 35 years as Chair of the RWJUH Rahway Division of Orthopedics. Dr. Kline was on the RWJUH Rahway Foundation's board from 1991 to 2014, and he, along with his wife, Christine, has been a longtime leader of the culture of philanthropy at the hospital. Christine Kline has been a Foundation board member since 1999, serving as both Chairman and Vice-Chairman and chairing the Rose Ball Committee, the hospital's annual fundraiser.



Nurses in the Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehabilitation programs at RWJUH Rahway now have a monitoring system that includes a detailed health picture of their patients. The new technology means that therapists and nurses can see patient history, the treatment plan, blood oxygen, blood sugar and much more. Funding for the system came from the philanthropic support of The Nicholas and Catherine Quadrel Foundation.



The Third Annual Women's Golf Classic and Clinic provided golfers of all skill levels a full day of activities while raising funds to support patient care services at RWJUH Rahway. "This event is an opportunity to empower and enable women, both on and off the course," said Heather Hays, vice president of development for RWJUH Rahway.
