New Professional Governance Structure Broadens Nurse Engagement

To make nursing professional governance more accessible to nurses throughout the hospital, RWJUH revamped its existing structure in ways that have facilitated greater participation, engagement and convenience.

Previously, the Shared Governance Council convened for an eight-hour meeting once each month to cover quality indicators and all other topics relevant to nursing. The new structure balances this content over several days, enabling nurses to better plan unit coverage in order to attend. It also helps ensure that nurses who are closest to the point of care can drive change.

Quality committees now meet on the third Wednesday of each month, and the fourth Wednesday is slated for a two-hour Staff Advisory Council (SAC) meeting attended by nurse chairs and co-chairs from each unit. These nurses then return to the unit to share knowledge from SAC and implement ideas as part of their own two-hour Unit-Based Council meeting held both in person and via video conferencing participation. The night shift also has a dedicated SAC meeting to address opportunities specific to their shift.

"I really appreciate that clinical nurses at the bedside and throughout the hospital have a forum to share any issues or concerns, and there's a structured process in place to address them," says SAC Co-Chair Emily Yang, RN, a clinical nurse on 2 Core. "As a newer nurse, serving on the SAC has also helped me gain insight on how different units function and ways we can adapt these perspectives to further ensure safe, confident, effective care."

When Yang and SAC Chair Lissette Malek, BSN, RN, bring input back to their units, everyone is willing to participate to take ideas to the next level. This might include forming task forces or committees, or volunteering for specific roles.

"It really feels like a family here; we come together with shared values to collaborate in ways that help our patients and the community," explains Malek, a clinical nurse on 4 Tower. "I'm so happy to be a part of it, and I can't imagine being anywhere else."

As highlighted through a "You Said, We Did" standing agenda item, Malek and Yang have seen many SAC recommendations coming to fruition and making a positive difference for the RWJUH team. For example, every unit now has a medical director accessible to nurses 24/7, enhancing efficiency and providing a comfort level similar to having a unit-based hospitalist.

"Our goal is to ensure that our nurses' voices are heard in a more meaningful way, which is truly the essence of the nursing profession," says Nicole Hartman, DNP, MBA, RN, NEA-BC, Vice President, Nursing Clinical Excellence at RWJUH. "Nurses have the opportunity to share their concerns and successes while learning from each other. This ultimately makes it easier to deliver the very best care for our patients."

"Fridays gained new meaning for me as I worked alongside mv mentee this semester. While answering her questions, I practiced self-reflection. While making introductions, I practiced communication and collaboration. While showing her the skills of a nurse, I practiced being a teacher. Although we practice these skills every day as leaders, having a mentee serves as a reminder that leaders should always be striving to teach others what excellence is and look inward to navigate how to do so authentically."

Mentorship Program Illuminates Pathways to Nursing

Research shows that when patients have concordance with their health care providers - including perceived connections related to racial and ethnic backgrounds - outcomes may improve.

Recognizing a need for a more diversified nursing workforce that broadens concordance, RWJUH submitted an application for a Pathway to Nursing project that earned 2024 Health Equity and Nursing Innovations funding from AARP, the American Association of Critical-Care Nurses (AACN), and the Future of Nursing: Campaign for Action. Projects were funded based on their ability to offer promising solutions to strengthen and diversify the nursing workforce through innovative nurse recruitment and retention strategies that establish and sustain healthy, equitable work environments.

"Our goals are to increase the number of Hispanic nurses to more closely align with the population we serve while enhancing leadership skills among our nursing assistant directors through mentorship opportunities," explains Mindy Markus-Rodden, PhD, RN, CPNP-AC, Assistant Vice President of Nursing Science, who developed the performance improvement project in collaboration with co-leads Claudia Pagani, MSN, RN, MEDSURG-BC, NPD-BC, Assistant Vice President, Center for Professional Development, Innovation and Research (CPDIR), Nicole Rolston MSN, RN, Nursing Education Specialist and Nicole Hartman, DNP, MBA, RN, NEA-BC, Vice President, Nursing Clinical Excellence.

With funding facilitated through the RWJ University Hospital Foundation, the Pathway to Nursing project has enabled high school students from the New Brunswick School of Health Sciences and Technology to shadow nursing mentors on the units, gain exposure to other nursing roles and participate in interactive educational experiences such as simulation lab sessions. Two cohorts launched in 2024, engaging 23 students.

"The first cohort will conclude with students presenting their innovative ideas at an event attended by nursing mentors, staff, parents, teachers and community members," adds Dr. Markus-Rodden. "It's been amazing to see how this project has brought everyone together for such an enriching, mutually beneficial experience."





Nurse-Planned Events Make Learning Fun

Throughout 2024, RWJUH nurses planned health fairs and events that provided education for their colleagues, patients and the community in fun, creative ways. At each of the following events, attendees received raffle tickets for engaging in learning and nurses earned evidence-based practice activity credits for participating.



Take Me to the Movies

To recognize Healthy Aging Month, the RWJUH team has typically held a staff resource fair in the fall with a focus on older adults. In 2024, nurses expanded this program to the local community and integrated falls and injury prevention resources. This Older Adult Resource Fair was coordinated by Donna Prete, MSN, NPD-BC. NE-BC, GERO-BC, RN-BC, Nursing Professional Development Specialist, Center for Professional

Development, Innovation and Research (CPDIR), Elizabeth Russer, MSN, RN, NPD-BC, PCCN, Nursing Professional Development Specialist-Simulation Coordinator, CPDIR, and Diana Starace, Trauma and Injury Prevention Program Coordinator, with participation from departments across the hospital.

Featuring the theme "Take Me to the Movies," the fair shared information, resources and services offered by RWJUH and local community organizations with 230 attendees. Each table selected a movie to engage participants - for example, the Emergency Department used "The Yellow Brick Road" to highlight safe mobility practices, and the Fall Prevention and Mobility Committee featured a falls crime scene investigation based on the movie "Clue." The event included musical performances, a tai chi demonstration, snacks and raffles.

"Staff, visitors and community members truly enjoyed the event," says Prete. "The expanded format and collaboration among nurses and other disciplines provided an opportunity to bring more awareness to the needs of older adults while sharing valuable health resources."

Safety Tips and Treats

In a collaborative annual effort spearheaded and supported by the Nursing Safety Committee, a Nursing Safety Fair welcomed more than 200 nurses, ancillary staff members and nursing students to enjoy Halloween-themed "safety stations" with poster presentations, raffles, candy and giveaways. Tables creatively staffed by committees and departments from across the hospital focused on topics such as needlestick safety, handwashing, workplace violence prevention, falls prevention and equipment safety.

"The event provided practical safety reminders while educating attendees about processes they may not have been as familiar with, such as filling out equipment repair forms and incident reports," says case manager Raegina Hawkins, BSN, RN, CCM, who served as the fair's Co-Chair together with fellow case manager and Co-Chair Imnas Williams, MSN, CMSRN, CCM, NATCEP, HHAI. "Plus, presenting information in a fun way helps people better retain what they learn."

An Ortho/Neuro Extravaganza

RWJUH celebrated Ortho/Neuro Week with a slate of educational presentations that culminated in an Ortho/Neuro Carnival staffed by 50 hospital volunteers and attended by more than 200 people. Every station at this experiential learning event featured evidence-based content approved by experts from throughout the hospital. Participants enjoyed interactive, carnival-style educational games ranging from Joint Commission Fishin' and SSI Ring Toss to Peri-Op Pop and Infection Prevention Jenga. The Rehabilitation team also staffed three tables with themes such as The Rolling Bones.

"Our staff really made this event a success, and it was wonderful to see all the smiling faces," says Orthopedic Coordinator Kyala Hayes, MSN, RN, ONC, CSSGB, who organized the carnival. "This event was a great example of how we can work together to make the world a better place, one day at a time. You could see the attendees' love for their specialty, passion for learning and desire to make patient care even better."



Nursing Perspectives from the Night Shift

Once family members bid their goodnights, patients have their evening medications and the busy pace of the shift change subsides, a unique rhythm settles into the night shift - at least until the early morning hours.

Work can typically be completed with fewer interruptions, but it also often requires a certain level of creativity and flexibility.

"Accessing resources that are more readily available during the day can be challenging, such as rapid feedback from a hospitalist or private physician groups, so we work together closely and creatively to keep things moving," says Tamara Alexander, BSN, RN, OCN, night shift clinical nurse on 5 North. "The teamwork at night is on another level; we quickly notice when someone needs a moment or could use a hand, and we do everything we can to help each other."

Alexander notes that accessing supplies used to be particularly challenging, but RWJUH recently implemented a process in which dedicated supply room staff restock each unit at night. The opportunity for nurses to provide input at night Staff Advisory Council (SAC) meetings has also resulted in positive change. For example, nurses shared that patients admitted in the evening from the Emergency Department were often hungry, and this feedback helped facilitate the development of a 7-11 p.m. night menu – along with higher patient satisfaction scores.

Patient Support

It's a misconception that patients sleep through the night; in reality, uninterrupted sleep is uncommon. While nurses strive to cluster care for fewer interruptions, most units require vitals every four hours, and patients may need medications and bathroom assistance. In addition, patients often need extra attention at night, when family members are not present and worries can spike.

"It's not unusual to see nurses spending extra time with patients, providing unrushed care and reassurance," says night shift Clinical Nursing Supervisor Nanayaa Breedy, RN, BSN. "As we build special connections with patients during these quieter moments, it's also easier for us to observe when something feels off. We then can relay this to the day shift so they can keep a close eye out for anything concerning."

The Right Flow

For night shift nurses, finding their own rhythm is important, too – and that means the right sleep/wake and shift schedules that serve both their work and personal lives. Camaraderie shines on this level as well, with some nurses going out for breakfast together after their shift. Other times, it's the simple things that make all the difference.

"A cup of tea and a quick snack at 3 a.m. is the pick me up that always gets me through," says Breedy. "I have to give a shout out to the cafeteria for staying open late at night. My mom was a night shift nurse on 5 Tower years ago, and she still talks about how much that meant to her."

"We embrace flexibility to do the best we can," adds Alexander. "I've worked in a number of places, and this is one of the strongest nursing teams you'll ever see."







Press Ganey Honors RWJUH Nursing Quality

RWJUH was awarded the 2024 Press Ganey Human Experience NDNQI® Award for Outstanding Nursing Quality in the Academic Medical Center (AMC) category. This accolade positions RWJUH as a national leader in the field of nursing, elevating the profession and raising the bar on standards of care.

Established by the American Nurses Association in 1998 and now a Press Ganey solution, the National Database of Nursing Quality Indicators® (NDNQI®) is the leading comprehensive nurse-sensitive indicators platform that collects and analyzes nursing data. This data is submitted by more than 2,000 facilities, including 95% of Magnet®-recognized facilities, enabling them to benchmark and assess their impact on clinical quality, patient outcomes and nurse workforce engagement measures.

"Many parameters impact outcomes, from the skill and experience of nurses to specific quality improvement measurements," says Kathy Easter MSN, RN, CCRN, Assistant Vice President, Nursing Excellence at RWJUH. "By submitting data to NDNQI, we can drill down to the unit level to determine how we are performing compared to hospitals like us across the country – in this case, academic medical centers with 500 or more beds."

Of more than 70 AMCs that were evaluated, RWJUH was the highest performing hospital. Rankings were determined by evaluating 17 quantitative and qualitative quality and workforce measures, including falls, pressure injuries and infections as well as nursing skill mix, degree and certification rates, turnover and experience.

"This prestigious national award demonstrates something we already know - our nurses are simply the best," adds Easter. "In addition to being caring and kind, they relentlessly pursue clinical excellence through their evidence-based practice. Their goal is to provide safe, patient-centered care of the highest quality, and we're very proud of their remarkable work."

Transatlantic Journal Club Builds Enduring Bridges

As part of the Magnet4Europe initiative to advance nursing care around the globe, RWJUH was one of 130 U.S. Magnet® hospitals to establish a nearly five-year twinning relationship with a counterpart in another country - in this case, Chelsea and Westminster Hospital NHS Foundation Trust in the United Kingdom. But the pair is one of the few internationally to continue formal efforts to build on this relationship after the Magnet4Europe initiative officially concluded.

"Nursing is a global practice with many common threads across countries," says Kathy Easter, MSN, RN, CCRN, Assistant Vice President, Nursing Excellence at RWJUH. "Even when an ocean separates us, we thrive on sharing knowledge and learning different perspectives that impact nursing practice and evidence-based care."

The strong bond between the two hospitals inspired the creation of a Transatlantic Journal Club in 2024. This process was guided by a Steering Committee comprised of Easter, Linda Tamburri, MS, RN, APN, CCRN, Clinical Nurse Specialist, Magnet/Quality, Mindy Markus-Rodden, PhD, RN, CPNP-AC, Assistant Vice President of Nursing Science, and their counterparts at the Trust in London.

With support from medical librarians at RWJUH Somerset and in London, the team established a process for monthly virtual meetings to review and discuss a journal article that relates to nursing practice. All nurses are invited to attend, with one from each hospital serving as moderators to introduce the article and guide the discussion.

Six Transatlantic Journal Club meetings were held in 2024, with topics such as nursing assessments of patient health literacy, increased mortality in elderly patients admitted with hyponatremia and disincentives to ethics consultation requests.

"These meetings have generated rich discussions, including how to apply our journal club insights to clinical practice," says Tamburri. "Our hope is that the ideas we generate will ultimately lead to joint research

projects, further s trengthening our bond and its benefits."



One-on-One Transatlantic Connections

In addition to these structured discussions, the two hospitals also initiated RCTs - randomized coffee trials - to facilitate connections between individual U.S. and UK nurses. Interested nurses from throughout each hospital completed a survey and were matched in 20 pairs following data review by a medical librarian. Each pair found a time to connect virtually, spending an hour discussing topics of their choosing, ranging from professional nursing practice to personal interests.

After the paired meetings, participants completed a survey about their experience and results were presented at a subsequent journal club.

"We've built enduring professional friendships through Magnet4Europe, and we wanted more team members to have that same opportunity," explains Tamburri. "The RCT discussions were a wonderful way to share perspectives and connect on a more organic level with a nurse counterpart in another country."

Nurse-Driven Research Continues to Expand

Research is gaining momentum at RWJUH, with nurses at all levels engaged in various projects.

"The culture is shifting to make research more top of mind," says Mindy Markus-Rodden, PhD, RN, CPNP-AC, Assistant Vice President of Nursing Science at RWJUH. "Enthusiasm for all forms of research-based efforts is expanding, including greater participation in the Nursing Inquiry Council."

As part of her many nurse-scientist functions, Dr. Markus-Rodden introduced several editions of an email-based nursing research report in 2024 to make research concepts less intimidating, promote research opportunities and share ways for nurses to get involved.

Nine nursing research studies were underway at RJWUH in 2024, some with manuscripts submitted for publication and others with podium presentations



"It's fulfilling to bring the current evidence to clinical nurses and support them as they ask new questions and seek out innovative solutions," she explains. "In working with nurses at the bedside, I better understand their work environment, and vice versa. This type of collaborative relationship helps ensure that our research is shaped to be as adaptable as possible to clinical care."



Research Spotlight: The Impact of MyChart Education on Patient Experience

Guided by principal investigator Dr. Markus-Rodden, this IRB-approved interdisciplinary research study involved 2 East Orthopedics and Medical-Surgical nurses, Nursing Professional Development Practitioner Sandia Royal, DNP, MSN, MPA, RN, CCRN, CNRN, Nursing Assistant Vice President Georgia Harrison, DNP, RN, CCRN, and two Robert Wood Johnson Medical School students, Sivani Alla and Rahul Kukreja.

The project's primary goal was to facilitate an increased use of the electronic health record portal by hospitalized patients to improve patient experience, care coordination and communication. The research study utilized an online survey designed to acquire information regarding a patient's experience during their hospital stay with or without the Epic MyChart patient portal, and to assess their perspectives of efficiency and engagement with patient-provider interactions after patient portal usage.

"In the past, there has been limited research on the utilization of patient portals among hospitalized patients," says Dr. Markus-Rodden. "This initiative has provided an additional opportunity for inpatients to better understand their medications and other health parameters prior to discharge, further contributing to patient safety."

Study results showed that by providing training on how to use the MyChart account, patients increased their knowledge about their care plan. Patients were able to utilize MyChart information to ask clarifying questions, share updated and accurate test results with supporting family members and have more autonomy in their daily care. Information gathered from this study will be used to develop recommendations regarding MyChart utilization and user education.

Orthopedic Coordinator Kyala Hayes, MSN, RN, ONC, CSSGB, and clinical nurse Sabina Thomas, BSN, RN-BC, will share findings from this study at the National Association of Orthopaedic Nurses (NAON) Annual Congress, and the study has also been submitted for publication.





Community Support Fosters Nursing Professional Growth

The generosity of community partners and the RWJ University Hospital Foundation continues to foster strong nursing professional growth across RWJUH. This unwavering commitment supports important initiatives that advance nursing excellence in professional practice and underscores the critical role the nursing team plays in delivering compassionate, high-quality patient care.

Nursing scholarships awarded by the Betty Wold Johnson Center for Nursing Education assist those who are pursuing degrees and furthering their education in nursing practice. In addition, funding support helps nurses attend regional, national and international nursing conferences, where they expand their knowledge in current evidence-based practice while networking with other nursing professionals. These opportunities empower the RWJUH team to stay at the forefront of nursing, returning with innovative best practices that directly enhance patient care and improve outcomes. Conference funding also supports nurses who are selected to deliver presentations at these programs, enabling them to share their expertise with nursing colleagues across the country and beyond.



Nursing Scholarships

For 2 East Orthopedics clinical nurse Katelyn Ribeiro, RN, receiving a nursing scholarship through the Betty Wold Johnson Center for Nursing Education Scholarship Awards has been instrumental in her professional growth. She is currently attending Chamberlain University, working on her MSN to become an adult gerontology acute care nurse practitioner.

"The scholarship has allowed me to further my education, expand my knowledge in orthopedic trauma care and integrate advanced clinical practices into patient care," says Ribeiro. "This support not only enhances my ability to provide evidence-based, compassionate care, but it also

inspires me to contribute to the nursing profession through mentorship and leadership. I am deeply grateful for this investment in nursing excellence and the positive impact it has on both caregivers and patients."

Conference Support

Cardiovascular ICU clinical nurse and Magnet Ambassador Council Chair CJ Dudek, BSN, RN-BC, attended the 2024 ANCC National Magnet Conference® in New Orleans through funding from the Foundation. As a first-time attendee, she was thankful to learn from and network with her colleagues and fellow nurses from around the world.

"Being able to attend the conference and see thousands of like-minded nurses striving to improve nursing care and the profession as a whole was inspiring," says Dudek. "It's a reminder of why nursing is an incredible field with so many who have so much to offer."

"Through the conference, I realized how much potential I have as a nurse," she adds. "The diverse topics, nursing innovations and networking opportunities all have served to help me improve my practice. I also recognized how many great things we already do - and continue to do - each and every day."

Sharing Knowledge

Audrey C. Kleet, DNP, MBA, ACNP-BC, CCRN, NEA-BC, Administrative Director, Advanced Practice Providers, received funding from the Foundation to attend two professional conferences where she shared knowledge through presentation opportunities.

At the 2024 American Association of Nurse Practitioners (AANP) National Conference in Nashville, Kleet gave a poster presentation on "Flush with Cash or Where's My Stash?" At the 17th Annual Advanced Practice Provider Leadership Summit, also in Nashville, she presented "Crunch the Numbers: Growing Your Value Proposition as an APP" and in collaboration with Anthony Patten, PA-C, participated in a panel session on "Advanced Practice Leadership Topics," where she co-presented "1+1 = Synergistic Leadership."



"In attending these conferences, I've learned best practices from advanced practice providers at other health systems and academic medical centers while networking with colleagues near and far," says Kleet. "I'm very grateful to the Foundation for supporting my professional growth and, in turn, enabling me to bring important information and new ideas back to our organization."
